CONCENTRATION AND FOCUS: YOURS (AND YOUR AIRPLANE'S) BEST FRIEND

Every time I do something dumb, I seem compelled to write about it. This article is about following the first rule of (full-scale) flying that I learned—before all other things, fly the airplane. Like all future FAA pilots, my instructor bombarded me with many things while I was flying such as:

What is your heading? What is the wind direction? Your heading is 170°, for VFR, what altitude are you supposed to be at (odd or even +500)? If you had to put down, where would it be? (My

instructor actually did that while secretly shutting off the fuel to my Cessna 152 simulating an inflight emergency while heading toward Agua Dulce).

Those who have earned this certificate from the FAA know exactly where I'm coming from. Why did he have me do that? To get me used to the fact that there can be many distractions going on while you are flying such as collision avoidance, faulty instruments, Automated Terminal Information Service transcriptions, passenger chatter in the cabin, and airport controller instructions. The point is, your

primary job as pilot in command is to focus on flying the airplane above all else. Okay, so one might ask why the rambling preamble?

Flying our models is no different than flying full-scale aircraft. The laws of gravity are the same and are just as unforgiving, especially when you lose focus. Case in point: One Sunday I was having a great day at our little electric field. The soccer season finished so we weren't booted off the field at 8:30 a.m. The weather was cold, but not so cold that your fingers lost feeling and more importantly, there was no wind

mains of my beloved "T-Cart," licking my wounds, and yes, I did get another Taylorcraft (Gorilla Glue couldn't fix this one).


